Notes to the Financial Statements For the Period Ended 30 June 2025

1 General information

This financial report covers Macquarie Vanilla Fund No. 78 (the "Trust") as an individual entity. The Trust was constituted on 5 February 2024. The Trust is a registered managed investment scheme domiciled in Australia. The Trust did not have any employees during the period ended 30 June 2025. The financial report of the Trust is presented in Australian dollars, which is also the functional currency of the Trust.

The Trust was registered with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission on 12 February 2024. The Trust is presenting its first financial statements for the period 12 February 2024 to 30 June 2025.

The Responsible Entity of the Trust is Macquarie Investment Management Australia Limited ("MIMAL" or the "Responsible Entity"). The Responsible Entity's registered office is Level 1, 1 Elizabeth Street, Sydney, NSW 2000.

The Trust has not commenced offering units during the period ended 30 June 2025 and there are no unitholders in the Trust as at 30 June 2025.

The financial statements of the Trust were authorised for issue by the directors on 8 September 2025. The directors of the Responsible Entity have the power to amend and reissue the financial report.

2 Summary of material accounting policies

Basis of preparation

This general purpose financial report has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards as issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the *Corporations Act 2001* in Australia. The Trust is a for-profit trust for the purpose of preparing financial statements.

The financial report is prepared on the basis of fair value measurement of assets and liabilities except where otherwise stated.

New accounting standards and interpretations

Certain new accounting standards and interpretations have been published that are not mandatory for the 30 June 2025 reporting period as below:

AASB 18 Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements

In June 2024, the Australian Accounting Standards Board issued AASB 18: *Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements* which sets out the requirements for the presentation and disclosure of information in general purpose financial statements. AASB 18 will replace AASB 101: *Presentation of Financial Statements*. AASB 18 is effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027, with earlier application permitted. The Responsible Entity is continuing to assess the full impact of adopting AASB 18.

Opinion
